On the agenda has been mainly following up on the work done during spring. During summer not much work has been done since we have been on vacation one after the other. Then, something has happened anyway. A letter has been written to University of Roskilde, International Development Studies and to University of Copenhagen, Centre of African Studies. In the letter we encourage students to help DLN finalizing the applications for Rural Self-Help Development Association (RSDA) and Development Peace and Education (DPE). This wish for help is founded on the fact that within DLN we do not have enough volunteers to do the amount of work it is to live up to the requirements of Projektrådgivningen for approving applications.

We have been taking up cooperation with Seniorer uden Grænser (Seniors without Frontiers). Those seniors work a lot with applications for projects. They have succeeded in slipping through the needle's eye of Projektrådgivningen. They have offered to read the applications and to give their advice to DLN.

Karen Steffensen has requested to leave the group working on the application for RSDA. In the Board, we regret but accept this.

Anders Hedegaard would like to continue the work for RSDA along with one or two students. Signe Hedegaard is joining the group.

How my first six months have been so far in the UK

I must say having worked in MS for eight years, helped me a lot with lessons on international relations and cultural diversity, which put me in the good position I am in today. It's almost months since I moved to the UK.

I can now safely say I have settled in my job. I have managed to secure and rent a place of my own, which is great, but I still do not believe what I am paying for the house and bills.

The first two to three weeks at my new office were mainly introduction. I was getting to know people, their ways of working and how their roles in the organisation would be linked to mine. My line Manager made all this very easy by holding my hand through out the process. The Oxford office, where I am based employs about 800 people. I work in the International division, and I am part of the International Finance Team. My role in the team is that of finance controller (operations and business development), with the main focus being on improving and developing the work of the finance communities across the world, where we work (partnerships, risk management and systems improvement). Even though I had already worked for the same organisation for two years the introduction was quite worthwhile, seeing that this new job entailed exiting new challenges.

For the first three months I was a lodger in a colleague's two-bedroomed apartment. My host and I had met on through the organizations daily messaging system. I advertised that I was looking for temporary accommodation and she responded back along with many other people. I chose her for close proximity to the office, so I could walk to and from the office. To my delight I had made a good choice, her flat was

Good as it was, I had to leave her and move to a place of my own. What a struggle that was!! The biggest shocks while house hunting were the sizes of the rooms in some of the houses, and how much the small spaces cost!! Fortunately I had enough time to compare homes and eventually settled for the 1930s semi detached house, in great condition having been recently renovated.



My cousin (Tseleng) from my home village, who is married here and is based in Wakefield, came to Oxford, to help me move into a new house in this weekend in May. We took a break from the hard work in the house to chill in the river.

So far I have visited Leeds, London, Manchester and a few towns surrounding Oxford City. I still have a lot to learn about Oxford itself and will do this in small steps. There is no hurry after all; I may be here for a long time. I have also managed to spend time with a few people from home (Lesotho and South Africa). I have made new friends from work, which has helped my settling in. It has been amazing to see the culture of giving that the people here possess. When people heard I was moving to my house, they were more than willing to offer me small items to help me start up, e.g.; toaster, lawn

The NGO Denmark Lesotho Network (DLN) was founded in 2002 by former Danish development workers in Lesotho and other good friends of the tiny mountain kingdom in Southern Africa. DLN aims at supporting NGO's in Lesotho in their work to develop civil society. DLN uses its network of people and organisations in Lesotho to pinpoint beneficiaries of DLN's support – and to keep an eye on that funding is used according to agreements made. DLN wishes to enhance knowledge of the living conditions in Lesotho and to seek funding from foundations, business enterprises and organisations for actual projects in Lesotho.

Membership of DLN

Anyone, who can support the aims of DLN, can achieve a membership. Members contribute to support initiatives in Lesotho that develop and better living conditions in the country. Members will receive an electronic newsletter four times a year and be invited to DLN's annual general assembly. The cost of a membership is 100 Danish kroner yearly.
